FUMC Missions

UMCOR comes alongside those who suffer from natural or human-caused disasters famine, hurricane, war, flood, fire or other events-to alleviate suffering and serve as a source of help and hope for the vulnerable. If you are unable to donate financially, you can also pray for the victims of the disasters and those helping the victims. The mission team would also like to thank everyone who donated financially to the February Second Mile Giving Sojourner Truth House. The mission team would also like to thank everyone for the financial contributions that was collected in November 2023 for Veterans Life-Changing services and the Indiana Veteran's Home. The total amount was \$845.00 We also like to thank you for the donation of the amount of \$1,489.28 for the Bishop's Christmas Offering for December of 2023 and the amount collected for Love Inc. in January of 2024 which was \$360.00.

WUMC's Missions

Heifer International was started in 1944 by founder Dan West, an Indiana farmer serving as a relief worker during the Spanish Civil War. He was ladling out milk to hungry refugee children and later he wrote "These children don't need a cup of milk, they need a cow." The charity sent its first shipment of 17 heifers to Puerto Rico. The first cows were named "Faith," "Hope" and "Charity." The recipient families had to promise they would donate the first female calf to another poor family. Heifer International would eventually broaden its scope to distribute fish, chickens, pigs, goats, sheep, cattle, oxen, water buffaloes, bees, llamas, alpacas, camels, frogs and rabbits to rural communities around the world. It is now a global nonprofit working to eradicate poverty and hunger through sustainable values-based holistic community development. Heifer International distributes animals, along with agricultural and value-based training, to families in need around the world as a means of providing self-sufficiency. A Little Something From Pastor Jim

March has arrived. It is spring-ish and our thoughts turn toward the change of seasons and the green and flowering things springing up from the cold ground. Personally, I struggle through winters. I don't like the cold, but I really struggle with the grayness. The sky is frequently gray, the trees are gray without their leaves, and even the snow turns gray with dirt and soot after just a day or two. My mood suffers and my hope for new life grows weak and weary.

For many of us, this is how we feel about this season of decline that our churches have been experiencing. We remember the days when our sanctuaries were filled, when children were everywhere, and when we had great participation in our events and ministries. Some of us long for a Springtime in the church. We want to have things the way that they were. We want to relive those memories; we want to again experience the vitality that feels like it has slipped away from us. Since that time of vitality, the world has changed, our communities have changed, and we have changed. These are all shifts in the various cultures that we inhabit and there is no going back to the good old days because those cultures have passed away. But that does not mean that there is no reason to hope, and it does not mean that there won't be a new Spring.

The Church is nothing if not a "communion" of people. It is people bound together by one faith and one baptism, not by having the same opinions and preferences. It is Jesus Christ who binds us together, but the process involves change which produces anxiety and a desire to maintain the status quo. But the status quo is exactly the thing that has led to our "gray winter" in the church. We must find the Spring and let something new burst forth.

This will be hard work and it will be chaotic and challenging. We will each have to evaluate what we value and let go of those things of lesser value in order to grab hold of something of higher value. Church consultant Gil Rendle says that "real community is created by working through disagreements." In that process, we have the opportunity to build trust, give and receive grace, and grow in love as we show love to others.

There is hard work ahead, but Christ will be with us each step of the way, springing forth with new life and bringing great joy to us and to our community. In the meantime, we have to prepare ourselves and our "garden" for the new growth. Rip out the dead stalks from the past, turn the soil over, and be ready to plant new seeds for a new harvest.

To Set the Example

Jesus taught that the call to love all people is the means through which we express our love to God. Dr. Sathi Clarke of Wesley Theological Seminary shares this message, "you cannot have only God alone and you cannot have only brother and sister alone. Becoming whole for the purpose of God involves both loving God and loving others." While Jesus took time with His disciples to teach them what it truly meant to be in relationship with God, He knew that before they would ever complete their journey, He would have to take a journey alone. Jesus knew that His journey to the cross would be a path He would have to travel all by Himself in total solitude.

The disciples were with Jesus for three years and Jesus provides both enlightenment as well as inspiration. As the time of His crucifixion and death draw closer, Jesus gives His disciples final marching orders: to love one another as He has loved them with humility and servanthood. To set the example, what does Jesus do? Scripture tells us in John 13: 1-5 that "Jesus knew the hour had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The evening meal was in progress, and the devil had already prompted Judas, the son of Simon Iscariot, to betray Jesus. Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his waist. After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him."

Two words come to mind: shock and awe. The disciples could not believe their eyes- their Lord and Savior in a total submission. They probably thought that there was no way for Jesus to surpass this extraordinary act of love and selflessness, but then, we fast-forward to Calvary.

As demonstrated by Jesus, John Wesley encourages early Methodists to understand that it is through service to others that we demonstrate our love and service to God. "There is no love of God without patience, and no patience without lowliness and sweetness of spirit. "Humility and patience are the surest proof of the increase of love..." In short.....you cannot have only God alone and you cannot have only brother and sister alone. Becoming whole for the purpose of God involves both loving God and loving others."

Merger Exploration

We will soon begin having regular Listening Sessions as the next phase of our Town Hall meetings. In these sessions, we will have breakout groups where you can ask questions and offer comments and opinions to the people involved in specific areas of the exploration. There will be multiple offerings over at least a couple of months. Currently, teams are meeting to study the property, finances, and staffing of both churches. The Finance team is completing a side-by-side comparisons of the income and expenses for each church which will give us a clearer picture of the financial implications of merging. The Staff Team is aligning job descriptions between the two churches and will soon determine overall staffing needs for a merged church.

An Unusual Situation

Ordinarily, when there is a pastoral change, the outgoing pastor must leave the church

completely for at least two years. This is because people have formed the habit of going to that pastor for guidance and direction and that is no longer their role. Additionally, that impedes the new pastor's ability to become the new leader. However, we are in the unusual situation of Pastor Pete being able to remain with us, and we are grateful for that blessing. Please respect Pastor Pete's retirement by not bringing pastoral issues to him. That puts him in an awkward position that is unfair to him and to Pastor Jim. If you have a question, issue, or suggestion, please take them to the person involved (as per Matthew 18) and/or to Pastor Jim.

Staff Parish Relations

Pastor James Denton, who has been the pastor of First United Methodist Church was appointed, as of March I, to a dual appointment to Woodmar and First United Methodist Churches. He will have office hours at both churches and will be available to members of both churches. As we alternate the location of worship services from month to month, he will lead worship at both churches. At the same time, First Church office manager Brenda Petty will become the office manager for both churches.
